GRIC recognizes MMIP Awareness Day, addresses new important issues

It's been two years since the Gila River Indian Community signed an official proclamation in 2021, declaring May 5 as Missing and Murdered Indigenous People Awareness Day.

"Today, as a Community, we reflect on the past three years as we honor the MMIP victims and survivors," said Lt. Gov. Monica Antone, "On this day, Gila River established our own MMIWP task force, which is led by our Office of General Counsel, Gila River Police Department, Tribal Social Services, Crime Victim Services, Behavioral Health, and many others who work together it was an ad hoc, which retrieved and understand that we all have a part to play, but it's not easy."

She shared that one of the biggest challenges has been jurisdiction and working with other law enforcement agencies, local towns, and cities.

Governor Kattie Hobbs signed an working with multiple outside executive order to enact an official state task force to address this issue further.

She referenced photos she keeps nearby her office desk of three young girls who have fallen victim to this crisis; Monique Pesqueria, Ashlynne Mike, and Rhia Almeida.

Ashlynne Mike was 11 years old when she was kidnapped, sexually assaulted, and brutally beaten. She was left to die in a remote desert area on the Navajo Nation

The Boys & Girls Clubs is the largest youth-serving agency in the nation, reaching about 90,000 Native youth in American Indian, Alaska Native, American Samoan, and Hawaiian tribal communities, according to its website.

Nearly 200 Clubs throughout the United States provide Native youth with a variety of culturally relevant, life-enhancing programs each year, including the Boys & Girls Club of the Gila River Indian Community: Sacaton and Komatke branches.

Antone has been attending the Community's Boys & Girls Clubs throughout her childhood

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COVID-19 VACCINE UPDATE:

OMICRON 2ND BOOSTER SHOT NOW AVAILABLE FOR ELDERS

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW:

- Elders 65 years of age and older can now receive a second Omicron booster shot four months after the first Omicron booster shot
- Unvaccinated individuals six years of age and above only need a single Omicron booster shot to complete COVID-19 vaccination; no need for multiple doses
- Most individuals under 65 years of age who have already received one Omicron booster shot are up-to-date and do not need additional Omicron booster shots

Children under six years of age and individuals with medical conditions that cause weakened immunity (cancer chemotherapy, transplant, etc.) should contact their healthcare provider for COVID-19 vaccine recommendations.

"All of these activities are part of never forgetting our relatives, never forgetting what they mean to us, never forgetting their connection to us," said Gov. Stephen Roe Lewis at the introduction of the walk.

Lt. Gov. Monica Antone shared a payer before the event started to recognize participating employees and acknowledged all individuals lost due to this national epidemic.

"It's all about these serious situations that happen to our children, our little ones, young ones, and adults that go missing and murdered in cases that we hear about," Lt. Gov. Antone said. "I just appreciate each of you coming out and each of the departments here and the [MMIP] task force in helping us with spreading awareness."

On Friday, April 21, the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) hosted its annual Earth Day celebration within the DEQ's administration grounds in District 3. This communal event brought together youth and Community members to learn about the importance of wildlife and environmental preservation through many conservation program booths and activities.

"Planting seeds for tomorrow" was this year's theme, noted by Tison Gill, Education and Outreach Specialist at DEQ. "Planting a seed, as in making youth interested in environmental studies," said Gill.

The celebration began at 10 a.m. with opening remarks from Tison Gill and a song followed by a blessing from 2023-24 Miss Gila River Lehua Lani Dosela. Following the blessing Blackwater, Gila Crossing, Sacaton, and head start, students formed lines with their teachers to tour the informational booths.

Booths included DEQ's divisions of air quality, water quality, fuel and restoration efforts. Along with, The Maricopa Audubon Society, Bureau of Indian Affairs Pima Agency Fire, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Tohono O'odham Community College, Chandler-Gilbert Community College, Jax Felling Company, Pima-Maricopa Irrigation Project. And also joining were other GRIC entities like Gila River Health Care, The Community Garden Project, Gila River Police Department, GRIC Tribal Education.

These educational conservation agencies informed many about their preservation efforts that also connect with the Community. For example, the Maricopa Audubon Society has helped with the Gila River Winter Bird Count for many years to preserve the natural habitats of birds that reside close to the Gila River and wetlands in the Community.



'We bring awareness to the crisis affecting all of us in Indian country." Lt. Gov. said, "The crisis has escalated with the recent discovery of fraudulent sober living homes where Indigenous people have been targeted, exploiting and go is currently working in the missing."

GRIC recently issued a fraud alert, giving awareness and attention to Community members and individuals from other tribes who have reported being approached in their communities by individuals and recruiters from facilities commonly known as sober living homes and group homes.

Community members report being offered transportation to these facilities and often have difficulty

returning to their homes or The sooner you call us then contacting family.

"During this time, the victims are subject to criminal activities in these fraudulent facilities," said Lt. Gov Antone, "What we know about these scammers is the recruiters may offer the following that you need to be aware of: regular meals, a place to stay, like shelters, transportation, and other monetary items."

She said some warning signs are direct in-person solicitation and unfamiliar or suspicious vans or vehicles with people looking to

Lt. Orlando Ramirez Criminal Investigations Division of the Gila River Police Department.

"As a lieutenant I supervise three police sergeants who supervise violent crimes, general crimes, and child and sex crimes units," said Lt. Ramirez.

He explained what to do in the event of a missing person or runaway, "In the case that you do have a missing or runaway loved one, you would contact pothe faster we can respond."

Officers will ask general questions about whom the person is, age, physical description, last known location, and who they were with. Once officers obtain all the necessary information, an officer will contact the reporting party.

"It's a checklist but they will fill out a form that will have all the pertinent information, depending on the circumstances of how this person went missing." Lt. Ramirez explained.

The officer's primary role is to gather that information and pass it along to dispatch, who provides it to the National Crime Information System and the Arizona Crime Information

"Basically, what that does is it puts a flag on that person so if any other agencies, any other police agencies come in contact with this person, it'll hit that they're a missing person, they'll contact us and then we will get in touch with them," said Lt. Ramirez.






