The Indian Law Section of the State Bar of Arizona presented Rodina Cave Parnell, Executive Director of the American Indian Law Center, Inc., with the Rodney B. Lewis Award of Excellence during their annual convention held at the Sheraton Wild Horse Pass on June 24.

The Rodney B. Lewis Award was established in 2018 to honor the legacy of the beloved Gila River Indian Community member and first Native American to successfully argue before the Supreme Court and advocate for tribal water rights. This award

The annual Gila River Youth Conference, hosted by the Akimel O'otham Pee Posh Youth Council, celebrated the theme "Culture, Continuity, and Change" with a two-day conference held in Tempe on June 20-21.

"This theme was chosen by our District 2 representative, Peyton Charles," said AOPPYC member Landon Martinez during a welcome address. "In this day and age as we as Native youth, we face many challenges regarding our culture, such as in this ever-changing society, 'how do we maintain our traditions while still keeping up with the times?'

Martinez added, "Our generation has learned to accomplish this in many ways, one of them being wearing your beautiful jewelry out and about, or even wearing traditional regalia or ribbon skirts in public."

The conference kicked off with remarks from Gila River

Young participants were of-Roe Lewis and keynote speaker, fered a diverse range of workshops, covering topics from healthcare, self-esteem building,

O'otham culture, content creation, law enforcement, and more. These workshops were designed to cater to a wide range of interests and needs. The conference also featured physical and cultural activities, ensuring a holistic and engaging experience for all.

Brian Yazzie (Navajo), a professional magician, hosted a workshop and performed as the evening's entertainment, which also featured music by DJ Lokie.

Day two of the Gila River Youth Conference featured inspiring messages from tribal leadership and a special guest whose story resonated with many in attendance

Lt. Gov. Regina Antone opened the day with remarks encouraging young people to build on their cultural strengths while continuing their education. She emphasized the importance of staying rooted in tradition while stepping confidently into leadership roles.

The keynote speaker, Kusem Goodwind—an actor featured in the Netflix series RezBall-

Ak-Chin Clinic patients are welcome to continue their relationship with GRHC doctors for their primary and available specialty care needs at our other campuses. We have maintained your medical records in our system to ensure you can easily continue your care with us. IHS / PIMC has received a copy of your medical records as part of the transition.

To continue your care with Gila River Health Care after October 1, 2025 please speak with your provider or contact the Gila River Health Care Transition team at 602-528-1212. For questions about services available through IHS/PIMC after October 1, 2025, please call (602) 263-1695.

First Annual 'Chop & Grill' Men's Health Event

The Gila River Tribal Health Department (THD) hosted the first annual Chop & Grill men's health event at Sacaton Fairgrounds on June 7.

According to Candalerian Preston, Director of Tribal Health Department, the community health nutrition program and tribal education department collaborated to host the chop & grill event for the National Men's Health Awareness Month. The Chop & Grill event is a combination of physical and nutrition health education for men in the Community.

"We're a patriarchal Community and June is a health awareness month for men. That's why we thought it was a good idea to have the men led event that focuses on mental, physical, and spiritual aspect of health awareness," said Preston.

According LaDawn to Yazzie, community health nutritionist, several teams from different departments came together for the Chop & Grill event. Anthony Gray, culture and language program manager, and Antonio Davis, cultural specialist, discussed and demonstrated traditional grilling techniques. Mohamad Sari-Basel Sbai, environmental health specialist and John Interpreter, environmental health specialist, discussed food

safety. Ryan Brown, lead fitness instructor, discussed wood chopping vis-a-via gym workout.

Gray and Davis started the event by discussing firewood for grilling. When you are hauling firewood, "Don't get wood that has been struck by a lightning. Lightning is a spirit. If a lightning claimed a tree, don't use it for firewood," said Gray.

"Tamarack is not for grilling, its used for something else. We use mesquite wood for grilling.

A lot of times people will chop down entire trees and leave the branches behind. But it's important to be resourceful and take the branches and dried twigs for kindling," said Davis.

"Many people think that chopping wood is only a man's job. But there are times when women chopped firewood especially when the men aren't available," said Gray.

According to Sbai, steak and kabob are cooked to 145-degree Fahrenheit whereas chicken is cooked to 165. Ground beef is cooked to 155 degrees. Thermometer is an essential tool.

In Gov. Stephen Roe Lewis' speech, he said, "June is Men's Health Month. It's important to embrace healthy lifestyle. This include eating healthy and physical fitness. We need to keep ourselves healthy so we can take care of our loved ones," said Gov. Lewis.

"The Chop & Grill event allowed us men to gather for friendship and comradery and learn about healthy lifestyle. We learned how to chop wood and grill steaks. We learn about healthy fruits and vegetables that

complements grilling. We learned about traditional fish diet such as Gila Trout and Sonoran Sucker. The first annual Chop & Grill event was an outstanding," said Gov. Lewis.

"The Chop & Grill was awesome. It was a successful event. The turnout was amazing. It was informative and fun for everyone who participated," said Brown.

"Cultural celebration brings people together. Thank you for inviting me to be part of the O'otham New Year celebration,"

said Mercado.

"Bird singing is part of the Yuman tribal culture. The bird songs have stories such as the origin and creation of the Yuman tribes. The bird songs are sung for many different occa-

songs. "I'll be singing social songs to celebration the O'otham New Year," said Mack. Terrance Peters, cultural director at the Boys & Girls Club of the Gila River

Indian Community, led his singing group, Xvik A'an, for the celebration. "Our group name, Xvik A'an, means Two Feathers. Xvik means 'two' in Pee Posh and A'an means 'feathers' in O'otham," said Peters.

The Xvik A'an wore matching black ribbon shirts. The group includes Jalen Peters, Russel Ringlero, David Andrews, Joseph White, Zaidin Enos,

and Kevin Ringlero.

"The drum is constructed out of a cardboard covered with black duct tape. The drumsticks are made from arrow weed sticks," Peters explained.

In the latter evening, Chi'Chino Spirit joined the Xvik A'an. They wore matching white ribbon shirts. The combined group had 14 singers. They sang social celebration songs throughout the evening. Community members danced in a circular fashion around the group.

According to Rhodes, a gift dance has gifts such as traditional clothing, household cleaning products, handkerchiefs and scarves. An individual who wants a gift danced with the lady who held the gift. The individual receives the gift at the end of the dance.

"We are going to get started with our give away. If any ladies would like to help with the giveaway, please come to the table, we need all the help we can get. During a gift dance, the men will sing and the ladies will dance with the gift. After one round, an audience member can choose a gift and he/she can dance with the lady," said Rhodes.

According to Sharpe, the Recreation Department purchased some of the

gifts. Renelda Blackwater and Teresa Giff made and donated traditional dresses and ribbon shirts. Harlan Barehand donated scarves and clothing. Community members also donated

"I'm so happy for the O'otham New Year. Right when the group started singing, I teared up and started crying because my prayers are answered. The new year celebration energy is powerful. I want to thank all of you for being here tonight. We are having a blessed new year celebration," said LaVerne Jackson, Community elder.

How to Get the Most from a Termite Treatment


Termite treatments to homes typically come with a warranty, anywhere from one to five years. Who applies the treatment, the pesticide they use, how they apply it and whether treatment is for a newly constructed or existing home, all factor in to the length of warranty extended to you.

Just like a vehicle's warranty, there are conditions that could void this. As a homeowner, be sure to read the documents provided by the pest management business treating your home or business and ask questions. Ask how long the warranty lasts and if there are things that you should and should not do to get the most out of your treatment

Following the maintenance schedule on your vehicle will help to keep its warranty valid. Similarly, preventative maintenance on your home, through general upkeep, will help to keep your termite warranty valid. The following are recommendations that can assist:

- Control Food Sources: Subterranean termites feed on soft wood materials in order to survive and build their colonies. Remove items from around your home that generally attract termites such as: cardboard, wooden pallets, landscape trimmings, stumps, dead vegetation and wood piles. These items are made of cellulose, which is food for termites and will attract these and other pests. If you must store these items, keep them at least 20 feet away from your home and elevated off the soil.
- **Control Moisture Sources:** Termites require water to live. Plumbing leaks and landscape plants or irrigation that are right up next to your home can provide the moisture termites need to thrive. Ensure all drains and gutters direct water away from your home and its foundation.
- **Inspect for Concrete Cracks and Erosion:** Foundation or concrete cracks can allow for termites to gain entrance to your home. Erosion or digging along the perimeter of your foundation, whether caused by rain, animals or humans, can break the treatment barrier, and void your warranty. It is recommended that you inspect regularly for signs of termites working their way into your home and any potential threats to the protective barrier(s) created by a termite treatment.

If your home is relatively new and you suspect a termite presence, reference the information provided to you when your home was turned over for more information. This may require reaching out to either the Department of Housing Development or the Pest Management Business that performed the work initially. 520-562-1863.



If your home is outside of the warranty period and you suspect a termite presence, homeowners can contact the Tribal Health Department - Environmental Health Services to request an assessment. 520-562-5100.

Issues in homes that fall under the Department of Community Housing can be brought to their maintenance office's attention. 520-796-4550.

As a homeowner in Arizona, it is not a matter of <u>if</u> termites affect you; it is a matter of <u>when</u>. Even a properly applied termite treatment and a vigilant homeowner who controls the above listed conditions, will need to remain vigilant and have the home retreated as necessary, for the life of the home. Be sure to plan accordingly and remember that any applicator that applies pesticide must do so according to the product's label and labeling, it's the law.

REQUEST FOR RELEASE OF FUNDS

On or about July 26, 2025, the Gila River Indian Community Department of Community Housing will submit a request to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the release of the funds to undertake a project known as Central Housing – 11 Units consisting of light demolition and renovation of 11 single-family housing units within the Central Housing Subdivision utilizing Native American Housing Assistance and Self Determination Act (NAHASDA) funds, Grant No. 5000906699009 (\$1,800,000), at the following addresses:

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

The Gila River Indian Community has determined the project will have no significant impact on the human environment. Therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) is not required. Additional project information is contained in the Environmental Review Record (ERR) on file at Gila River Indian Community Department of Community Housing at 136 Main Street in Sacaton, Arizona 85147 and may be examined or copied weekdays 8 AM to 5 PM.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Any individual, group, or agency may submit written comments on the ERR to the Gila River Indian Community Department of Community Housing, Jeffrey Jordan, Project Manager. All comments received by July 25, 2025, will be considered by the Gila River Indian Community prior to authorizing submission of a request for release of funds. Comments should specify whether they address the Finding of No Significant Impact or the Request for Release of Funds.

ENVIRONMENTAL CERTIFICATION

The Gila River Indian Community certifies to HUD that Stephen Roe Lewis in his capacity as Governor consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. HUD's approval of the certification satisfies its responsibilities under NEPA and related laws and authorities and allows Gila River Indian Community to use Program funds.

OBJECTIONS TO RELEASE OF FUNDS

HUD will accept objections to its release of fund and the Gila River Indian Community's certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of the Gila River Indian Community; (b) the Gila River Indian Community has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58; (c) the grant recipient or other participants in the development process have committed funds, incurred costs or undertaken activities not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by HUD; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality .

Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedures (24 CFR Part 58, Sec. 58.76) and shall be addressed to HUD at: Patrick Palmer, Lead Grants Management Specialist, Grants Management Division, 2800 N. Central, Suite 700, Phoenix, Arizona 85004, tel: 602-379-7197, email: Patrick.E.Palmer@hud.gov. Potential objectors should contact HUD/State to verify the actual last day of the objection period.

recognizes attorneys who embody "honesty, integrity, courage, grace, dignity, and respect" in their service to Indian Country.

Parnell, Quechua (Peruvian Indian), is a former Director of the Pre-Law Summer Institute for Americans and Alaskan Natives and practiced law in Arizona and New Mexico, representing tribes and tribal entities in legal and administrative proceedings in environmental matters and on several large breachof-trust cases in federal courts. In 2013-2015, she served, by presidential appointment, as Senior Policy Advisor to the Assistant Secretary of Indian Affairs in the U.S. Department of the Interior.

"I don't think that we truly understand how much work that he has done and the influence that he has

had on this Community and the ripples that go out from here," said Parnell during her acceptance speech. "Any connection to Rod Lewis is a true honor to me, especially given the work that I'm doing now."

Gov. Stephen Roe Lewis was also in attendance for the award presentation. "It's an honor on behalf of my family and also the Gila River Indian Community that they're through the Rod Lewis Award, that they're keeping my father's vision and legacy alive," said Gov. Lewis. "He was all about supporting and mentoring and investing in the next generations of Native attorneys, supporting them coming up through the ranks, but also, you know, providing them with the resources and the tools that they need to be successful."

Rod Lewis was part of the first class of the Pre-Law Summer Institute (PLSI) in 1967 and continued to advocate for the program, an intensive two-month program at the University of New Mexico, that prepares American Indian and Alaska Native individuals for the rigors of law school by essentially replicating their first semester.

Gov. Lewis added, "He epitomizes the potential that he had that he used to bring that back to his people, to his community, and with that powerful example, that just shows how powerful it is to keep on investing in these next generations, because we see when we invest in these next generations of Native attorneys, we see the amazing work that they do to protect tribal sovereignty at all levels."

What is Ultraviolet (UV) radiation?

Are you a Vietnam Veteran?

Did you know there are other agents besides Agent Orange? They were referred to as rainbow agents: blue, white, pink, green, purple and orange. They were all herbicides of a different chemical mixtures. Herbicides were used to defoliate any vegetation the enemy might use to hide. As a general rule, the agents were stored in a 55 gallon drum with a colored band around it. The color of the band indicated which of the rainbow herbicides it contained. Agent Orange was the most used herbicide. The United States used more than 11.7 million gallons between 1965-1970 alone. Agent Orange is best known because it contained a chemical called dioxin. As the Agent Orange was being sprayed, sometimes

it would make direct contact on fighting men. It remained on the surfaces of whatever it touched. It could be absorbed by plants growing in soil, get into the water supply or ocean. The water was used for cooking, drinking and bathing. Agent Orange was absorbed by the seafood later eaten. Direct contact with the skin might cause symptoms to manifest quickly. Other health side effects may take decades to man-

There is a lot of talk about the Agent Orange Registry, but what is it? If you are concerned about your exposure or possible exposure to Agent Orange, then listen up. The registry is a VA Program that offers a free exam concerning potential health problems related to Agent Orange. They also look at the data collected to determine what new conditions may be added to the Agent Orange Presumptive List. Anything on the presumptive list means less burden on the veteran to prove exposure and how the medical condition relates to the exposure. If you are in one of the qualifying locations,

then you are "presumed" exposed automatically. This includes veterans that were boots-down and those on Navy ships within 12 nautical miles of Vietnam. Qualifying locations are Vietnam, Thailand, Laos, Cambodia, Guam/Samoa (and its waters) and Johnston Atoll.

The Agent Orange Presumptive List currently contains 17 medical conditions. If those conditions cause other conditions, you can also file for those as secondary conditions. This is because they were caused by the primary condition. If your service connected conditions get worse. It may be possible to file for increases. There are times when the VA will pay above 100%. If there is a surviving spouse of a veteran and one of the veteran's service connected disabilities is listed on the death certificate (primary cause or long term health condition) then the surviving spouse may be eligible for a monthly benefit for the rest of their life.

The name for this month translates to 'the rainy month' and refers to the arrival of the summer Monsoon rains. During this time of year, we experience an increase in moisture both in the form of high humidity and periodic rainfall brought north by the summer rains. This increase in moisture is beneficial to plants and animals. The "haichu mu:val" or insects also benefit from this added increase in moisture. In this article, we will introduce six insects that you might be able to observe until the landscape dries out in the fall.

Some insects are considered pests, as they are troublesome to pets and O'otham. Insects that are easily heard are the kok'thpol (cicadas), we can hear them buzzing amongst the mesquite trees throughout the community. In former times, O'oth-

am captured the kok'thpol and roasted them over an open fire and ate them as a snack. Today, cicadas are a source of food for different cultures around the world. One insect that is a troublesome pest to our go'gogs (dogs) are ma:msh (ticks) that imbed themselves under the fur of our shoiga (pet). We often purchase collars, powders and soaps to fend off these troublesome insects. Vi:psh (mud wasps) like to build their mud nests under the eaves of our roofs and abandoned buildings, its best to leave them alone, as they will defend their nests.

One insect that defends itself with a chemical spray is the bithokoi (stinkbug). It is best not to let young children and pets bother these insects, as they can spray an oily, stinky secretion several inches away. The agitated bithokoi will stand on its head and point its rear end toward the offender before releasing its chemicals. There are sev-

eral different species of sho:'o (grasshoppers) that we encounter in our yards and when we are out walking our pets. It is hard not to miss them, as they fly up ahead of us with wings making a clicking rasp and land several feet away. This is also the time of year when we observe male hiañ (tarantula) leaving their underground burrows to look for females to mate with and reproduce the species. Hiañ can be observed crossing roadways and open ground, they are experts at climbing walls.

This month's word match will focus on these six insects. We encourage you to learn their names and use them in your every-day lives. Speak with an Elder or Speaker and learn to say the names. Insect names may be slightly different between the villages. We encourage you to use caution around certain insects, as they can bite, sting or spray chemicals.

This notice shall satisfy two separate but related procedural requirements for activities to be undertaken by the Gila River Indian Community.

REQUEST FOR RELEASE OF FUNDS

On or about July 26, 2025, the Gila River Indian Community Department of Community Housing will submit a request to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the release of the following funds to undertake a project known as the New Housing Development at 1241 West Santan Road, Santan, Arizona, consisting of the new construction of 10 duplex apartments and a multipurpose building on approximately 4.7 acres of vacant land, Indian Housing Block Grant American Rescue Plan, Grant No. 55IT0401760 (\$1,200,000).

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

The Gila River Indian Community has determined the project will have no significant impact on the human environment. Therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA) is not required. Additional project information is contained in the Environmental Review Record (ERR) on file at Gila River Indian Community Department of Community Housing at 136 Main Street in Sacaton, Arizona 85147 and may be examined or copied weekdays 8 AM to 5 PM.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Any individual, group, or agency may submit written comments on the ERR to the Gila River Indian Community Department of Community Housing, Jeffrey Jordan, Project Manager. All comments received by July 25, 2025, will be considered by the Gila River Indian Community prior to authorizing submission of a request for release of funds. Comments should specify whether they address the Finding of No Significant Impact or the Request for Release of Funds.

ENVIRONMENTAL CERTIFICATION

The Gila River Indian Community certifies to HUD that Stephen Roe Lewis in his capacity as Governor consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. HUD's approval of the certification satisfies its responsibilities under NEPA and related laws and authorities and allows Gila River Indian Community to use Program funds.

OBJECTIONS TO RELEASE OF FUNDS

HUD will accept objections to its release of funds and the Gila River Indian Community's certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of the Gila River Indian Community; (b) the Gila River Indian Community has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58; (c) the grant recipient or other participants in the development process have committed funds, incurred costs or undertaken activities not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by HUD; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality. The Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) will be preparing a Tier 2 Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) and Design Concept Report (DCR) for the proposed 31-mile segment of State Route 505 between Arizona Farms Road and Interstate 10 (I-10), known as the North-South Segment 2 Study.

The purpose and need for the project was established in the Tier 1 study and will be refined in the Tier 2 EIS. The purpose of the project is to improve the transportation network to accommodate existing and future populations, improve access and regional mobility, provide an alternative to I-10, improve north-to-south connectivity and integrate the region's transportation network. This study will:

- » Develop and evaluate a range of alternatives for potential 400-foot-wide freeway alignments within the selected 1,500-foot Tier 1 study corridor, as well as potential interchange locations and other design features
- » Identify environmental considerations, avoidance, minimization and mitigation
- » Develop design concepts for the alternatives
- » Prepare draft and final EIS and DCR documents identifying the Preferred Alternative and issue a Record of Decision identifying the Selected Alternative
